In addition to serving as the Chief Executive Officer of Orange-Ulster BOCES, the District Superintendent acts in three capacities:

- As a consultant to individual districts;
- As a liaison between component districts and the State Education Department; and
- Upon request, will serve as a consultant for component districts in the search process for a new superintendent of schools.

The following are some of the responsibilities of all 37 District Superintendents in the State of New York:

- Facilitate communication and cooperation between districts, the State Education Department, and other public and private agencies.
- Interpret and clarify Education Law, Commissioner's Regulations, and other policies affecting education in this region; and serve as the regional contact point for State initiatives, such as the new Standards, Capacity, and Assessment initiatives.
- Assist in developing educational policy while working closely with area legislators on behalf of public education.





- Report to the Commissioner and work closely with the Senior Deputy Commissioner.
- Conduct Registration reviews in New York City and within the BOCES supervisory area, as well as for those schools identified as requiring improvement.
- Assist with reorganization studies in participating districts and coordinate related efficiency grants.
- Investigate, hear, and decide upon boundary line disputes between districts. Provide advice and counsel to local Boards of Education and in-service education for local superintendents.
- Take cases on appeal and report testimony to the Commissioner, as directed.
- Provide assistance to non-public schools.
- Act on behalf of other District Superintendents.
- Approve BOCES service contracts and cross contracts.

The BOCES Career and Technical Education Division has programs located on two campuses in Goshen, one on Gibson Road and the other on Harriman Drive at the Regional Education Center at Arden Hill. Twelve career academies offer high school students a variety of career and technical programs. Practical Nursing/Health Career programs are offered at the Regional Education Center at Arden Hill in state-of-the-art classrooms and labs.

Through an integrated academic curriculum in each classroom, CTE students are able to earn English, math and science credit (depending on the program) while participating in one of 39 specialized career and technical programs. Many of the career academies are nationally accredited and feature leading-edge technology, as well as instructors with the latest trade experience. Work-based learning opportunities in local businesses help to develop students' skills beyond classroom experiences. Our students have access to college credits and career opportunities upon successfully completing their program.

Consortium purchasing for school districts includes Internet, computers, networking hardware, computer software, audio/ video products, and instructional aids such as interactive white boards, etc. Orange-Ulster BOCES Technical Support Services is dedicated to providing the latest technology to its component districts. The state-of-the-art secure data center, strategically located at the Regional Education Center at Arden Hill, continues to meet the growing data security and access demands of our component districts.

- All power into the data center is fully redundant, including backup generator power.
- Cutting-edge technologies allow fall-over to a backup connection in less than 7 seconds in the event of a fiber cut, avoiding any perceived interruption.
- On-site personnel are trained and available to provide immediate support if the need arises.
- Safety features, including a comprehensive fire control system, are in place.
- Current technology conserves energy.
- Facilities have been designed and re-purposed to support a state-of-the-art infrastructure.
- Component school districts are provided continuous operation, continuous support, security and flexibility.

Along with our robust lineup of vocational classes, literacy classes are also offered day and night in many locations throughout Orange County and include High School



English as a Second Language (ESL) classes are designed for all levels of English language learners from non-Enlish speakers to those with some English fluency who are looking to improve their overall reading, writing, and speaking. These programs run continuously, are flexible and can be tailored to fit into anyone's busy schedule. Furthermore, these HSE and ESL classes offered by Orange-Ulster BOCES are free of charge for all participants.
